





# Three Counties gets to show its class

DOMINIC Newman's 12th man duties on Monday in Glamorgan's drawn County Championship match at Abergavenny against Somerset has brought more acclaim for the WG Cricket Three Counties League this season.

So often thought the poor relation of the Famous Grouse Western League, the Three Counties has seen a major influx of quality players from home and abroad in recent seasons.

Newman, who joined Abergavenny from Queensland this term, is coming under the gaze of Glamorgan for next season as he wouldn't qualify as an overseas players because he was born in Britain.

But the hard-hitting left arm seamer is just one of a crop of overseas and former first class players now on duty in the Three Counties League.

Two seasons ago Abergavenny pulled off a major coup is snapping up Antiguan paceman Hamesh Anthony, who was on Glamorgan's books for that term.

Anthony proved an instant success for the Gwent club in the Three Counties League finishing second in the bowling averages with 65 wickets at a cost of 10.69 each and tenth in the batting averages scoring 538 runs at an average of 38.40.

When Anthony failed to return to Wales for the following season Abergavenny turned their attentions to India where they picked up allrounder Ajay Bannerjee.

Although Bannerjee never really got to grips with the wickets he displayed a full range of bowling skills from seamers to spin as well as a number of quality performances with the bat. By Anthony Woolford

This season apart from Newman, Abergavenny have looked in the direction of Worcestershire for inspiration with the signature of Damian D'Oliveira though the middle order bat and slow bowler has yet to play regularly at the Avenue Road Ground through first team commitments.

Ironically D'Oliveira learned his trade in the Three Counties League as a 16-year-old playing for two-times champions Worcester City, who also had Martin Weston and West Indian Vanburn Holder among their ranks.

Abergavenny are not the only Gwent club to have recruited from outside the county, Panteg have made a number of new signings this season and the Pontypool-based side are now poised to become the first Gwent club since 1975 to lift the First Division title.

Seventeen years ago Abergavenny stopped Hereford marching to a fourth consecutive title and since then all that Gwent clubs could muster were runners-up spots for Panteg in 1976 and 1977 while Abergavenny came second in 1982.

Panteg have built up a healthy points buffer between themselves and nearest rivals Frocester and Winget, as well as reaching the semi-finals of the Three Counties League Cup.

Though they have a number of difficult matches ahead, Panteg are the only unbeaten side in the league while the chasing pack have lost at least two matches this term.

And it is no coincidence that the change of fortunes for Panteg came with the signature of former Kent seamer Kevin Jarvis, who was released from his contract at Gloucestershire last season.

Though Jarvis has yet to rip through a side, his miserly opening spells with the new ball has been the inspiration for the Panteg bowlers around him.

As well as Jarvis, former Warwickshire seconds player Graham Clutton, Ireland international spinner Stuart Taylor, Welsh international opening bowler Huw Rogers have been the other new arrivals at the club this season.

But it has been two young home grown players grabbing most of the limelight with young Stuart Rosser enjoying a run-laden summer, hitting a century against Abergavenny as well as 94 against Cirencester. Half centuries against Clevedon and Colwall also followed this season.

Allrounder Mark Davies also showed his mettle with bat and ball in Panteg's crunch cup match at high-flying Stinchcombe, who boast a couple of South African players among their ranks.

Usk too, have a major new face among their ranks in West Indian Tenyson Roach, who was among the Barbados Under-25 team which undertook an extensive tour of Great Britain last season including a game against the Monmouthshire Cricket Association at Usk.

Usk are merely following in the footsteps of Hereford who have gone to the West Indian island for players over the last couple of seasons with one of their recruits, Dale Ellcock topping the Three Counties League bowling record for a mammoth 84-wicket haul in 1988.
