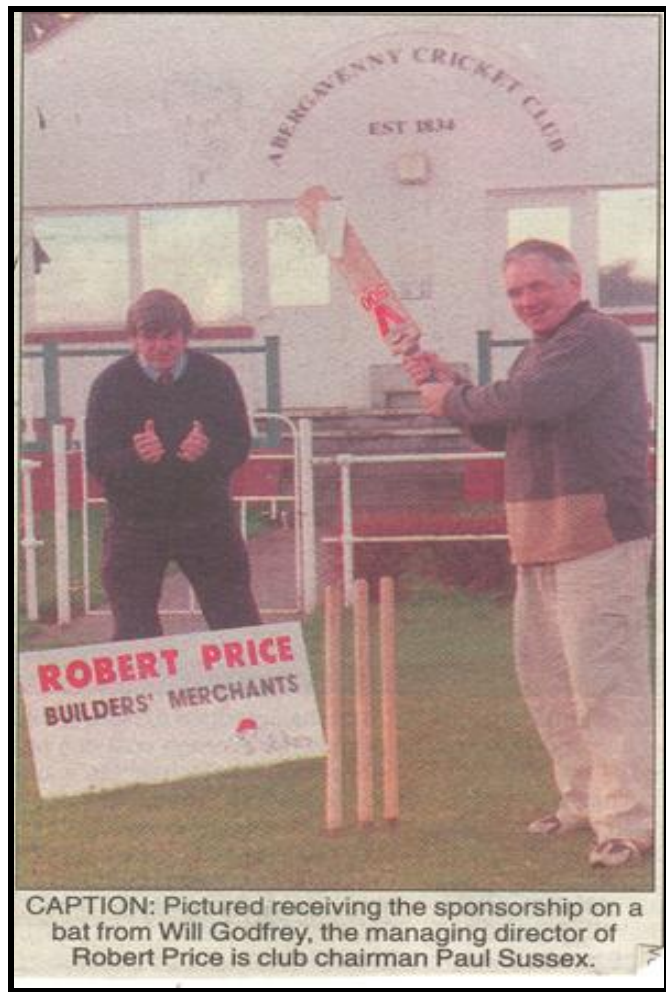

ABERGAVENNY Cricket Club's new Australian coach Alan Free certainly knows a thing or two about taking wickets and the club are sure he will work wonders with their young players.

In his pomp, Alan played for Norths Cricket Club in Brisbane, Queensland, for 15 seasons, including three in the Premiership.

He is the leading wicket taker in Brisbane state cricket with 521 wickets, and holds the record for most wickets in a season with 59. He achieved Sheffield Shield Squad status for two years.

Alan is a level two coach and took charge of Norths in 1978-1981 and again between 1996-1999. He was also senior coach and coordinator for Queensland Cricketers Club coaching camps from 1991-2000.

When playing, he represented Queensland

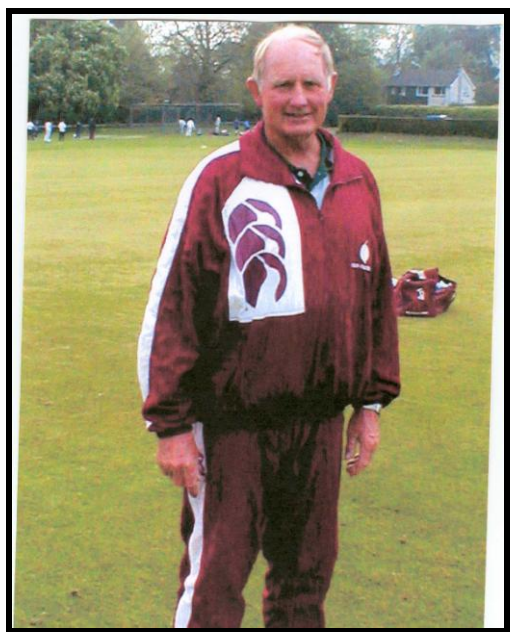


Colts Under 23 and played with and against some top names including Geoff Dymock, Graham White, Wally Grout, Ken Mackay and Tony Dell.

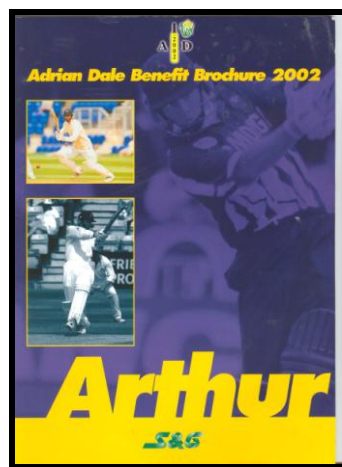

Avenue Road among county cricket's 'castaways'

ABERGAVERNENY'S Avenue Road cricket ground features in a new book by Nico Craven which celebrates some of the best grounds in Britain where county cricket can no longer be seen.

The book 'County Cricket's Castaways' is an edited collection of pieces written by Craven over 30 years and the opening chapter is devoted to the Abergavenny Cricket Club ground, which is described as being 'like heaven on earth.'

The chapter covers the 1991 championship clash between Glamorgan and Gloucestershire, which Glamorgan won by nine wickets in a match which saw over 1,300 runs scored.

He recalls his full English breakfast in Wales, at the Gliffaes Hotel near Crickhowell - 'a king-sized Gliffaes kipper followed by home-made marmalade every bit as good as the pitch at Abergavenny.'

Craven praises the friendly staff at the ground, including 'Dinky' Beaumont and her catering staff, the lack of commercialisation and the beauty of the ground itself and the surrounding area.

Craven writes, 'I raised my eyes to the hills encompassing the ground: Dewi, Blwngw and Skirrid - and my cup in the direction of the towering Sugar Loaf mountain. Their awe-inspiring presence had brought an added stature to what had been an August occasion in more ways than one.'

The book is a glowing testimony to county cricket's festive past and the loss to the game by what he describes as the 'creeping centralisation of fixtures.'


The cost per team is £160, which includes the round of golf, a cold buffet, prizes and donation to the two causes.

Abergavenny - out but not down as chairman vows 'We'll be back!'

"ABSOLUTELY devastated." Those were the words of cricket club chairman Paul Sussex following Abergavenny's failure to avoid relegation at the weekend, writes Laura Pike.

The 1999 Thomas Carroll Premiership champions will play in Division One next season after drawing in their final make-or-break match against Usk on Saturday.

This will be the first time in the club's long and distinguished history that they have not been in the top flight of cricket. However, the former champions have warned 'we will be back'.

"Obviously the club is devastated but there is not much we can do about it now," said a dejected Sussex.

"We've learnt a valuable lesson and just hope that it is not going to have an effect on the future of cricket in the town."

Remaining optimistic however, he added, "On a more positive note we hope to retain most of our players and if we rally together, we hope to bounce straight back next year."

Glamorgan county star Mike Powell, suspended for two matches after a training incident at the county club a fortnight ago, boosted Abergavenny's hopes of avoiding relegation by playing for the team during the crucial match. Powell began his career with the Monmouthshire club and gave a tremendous professional performance with both bat and ball.

Andrew Jones, who has captained the side magnificently during the absence of Ben Powell, also showed his class as a batsman with his second successive century.

The final total of 246 all out was unsatisfactory for the Avenue Road side as at one time they were 197 for one, with plenty of overs remaining.

Lee James and Mike Powell were the only other two batsmen to make any sort of contribution.

To stand any chance of avoiding relegation, Abergavenny needed to bowl out Usk to secure the 21 points which would have ensured top flight cricket next season.

In the end, Usk limped to 230 for six at the close to deny the club any such privilege.
