

In late May the Club entertained Usk who batting first made 176-4. WH Watkins 1-29, JD Jones 1-31, AM Cunliffe 1-34 and JR Jacob 1-1. In reply Abergavenny held on for a lucky draw at 112-9, SW White(19) AL Tatham (61) and JH Addie (11)

In 1900 Dr AL Tatham headed the batting averages with 42.0 with his highest score being 66 against Monmouth Grammar School and 61 (A brilliant knock) against Usk.

Montague Harris, nicknamed 'The Master', Dr AL Tatham, JD Jones, WH Watkins, W.Llewellyn, SW White and PC Phillips. Phillips in 1900 scored 186 runs against Mr H Bowen's X1 at that time the highest individual score on Penypound

Tatham, Phillips and Jacob all represented Monmouthshire.


### Averages-1900

Abergavenny v Crickhowell- This match was played on Saturday last on May 19<sup>th</sup>, Abergavenny sent a strong eleven to meet the Crickhowell Club on the ground of the latter. Unfortunately the home club contrary to the state of affairs put an inferior eleven in the field, with the result that the visitors had little difficulty in winning the match which they did by 118 runs- The following were the scores.

Abergavenny v Usk- The return match at Usk between these clubs was played on August 11<sup>th</sup> 1900. The wicket favoured the bowlers and the scores were in consequence small, the visitors scoring only 55 in their first innings and the homesters 75. In the second attempt Abergavenny had made 51 for 4 wickets when some discussion arose as to a decision of the Abergavenny umpire and the Usk men refusing to abide by his decision left the field, it being about an hour and a half before the time arranged for drawing stumps, and the game was thus brought to a very unsatisfactory close. ### SUBSCRIPTION DANCE.

Judging by the attendance at the Town Hall, on Wednesday night, the **ABERCAVENNY Cricket Club** has attained a degree of popularity far exceeding the aspirations of its warmest supporters. The organisers of the dance are to be felicitated on the success of their efforts, as will be well understood on perusing the appended list of those present, which we have endeavoured to make comprehensive, and assure our readers that if any names are omitted it is not through invidious selection, but from failure to obtain names through circumstances over which we had no control.

The hall was profusely decorated with flags and bannets, the orchestra being tastefully dressed with a profusion of choice palmate plants, under the shadow of which the excellent quadrille band, supplied by Mr. L. H. Evans, did its work to the satisfaction of the dancers. At the lower end of end of the room, a portion of the stage had been left, and with the aid of screens and shrubs, formed a series of most inviting alcoves to which tired dancers could retire. The various plants used in the decorations were kindly lent by the Marquess of Aberqaveenny, and the decoration were carried out by his Lordship's under gardeners, superintended by Mr. John Chinnery.

On the top landing of the rear exit from the Hall was a refreshment bar, supplied by Mr. Blencarnesett, of the Greyhound Hotel, and here Mr. Thomas Williams and his son, Mr. William Williams, dispensed liquors of a description not to be found in the light refreshment bar, in the Corn Exchange, presided over by Mr. C. H. Sayce, of High-street and Frogmore-street. The supper table was very prettily decorated with choice flowers, amongst which the chrysanthemum was conspicuous. The disposition of the various dishes on the table was very artistic, and the beautiful plimago of the pheasants marking game pies, and other delicacies claimed attention. The menu was varied, and included *soles à la pie, filez gras au sauté, pintade à la maitre d'hôtel, pigeon pie, rabbit pie, chaudière de poulet au sauté*, and several other old friends with new faces and names.
