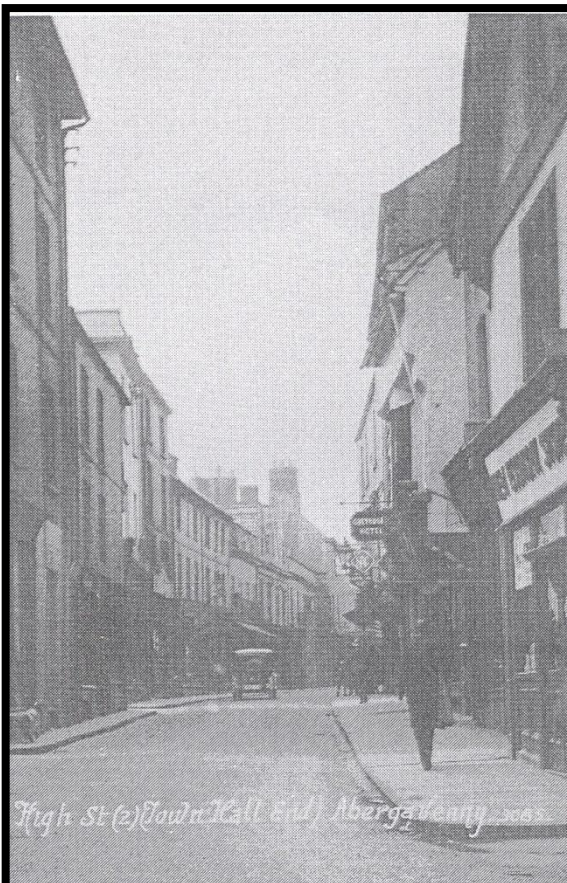

16. The town hall end of High Street, before Red Square and pedestrianisation. The correct name for Red Square is in fact High Cross which local dignitaries would prefer to be used. On the right, a sign for the **Greyhound Hotel** can be seen. On a tariff souvenir which was produced, it states: 'Accommodation comprises a spacious coffee room, a sitting room, a smoke room, commercial rooms, 18 bedrooms with hot and cold water fittings. The bar is a cosy rendezvous. Special arrangements for wedding parties and other functions are made in a large private dining room. Tariff: Weekly £9.9.0: 19/- per night: 3/3d for bath.'

For today's generation who will not recall pre-decimal currency perhaps, £9.9.0 is £9.45, 19/- is 95p and 3/3d is 16p. More than reasonable prices by today's standards!
