The chair was taken by Mr. J. R. Jacob, supported by Dr. Tresawna and Mr. F. R. Britton, and there was a good attendance of representative exponents and supporters of the game. There was a considerable amount of discussion, and ultimately the following resolution was adopted on the proposition of Mr. F. R. Britton, seconded by Mr. W. Llewellyn This committee recommends to the General Meeting that the Shop Assistants' Club be accepted as members of the Town Club at the -usual subscription of 10s. 6d. Bona-fide shop assistants, whose names shall be approved by the committee of the Abergavenny C.C., to be admitted at an annual subscription of 5 s. each. The Shop Assistants to be represented by one member on the Ground Committee for the ensuing season only. The AGM was held in the Greyhound Hotel- The Committee elected- M. Partridge and Dr. Tresawna together, and runs commenced to come at a great pace, both men hitting all round the wicket. 





MONMOUTHSHIRE v. CARMARTHENSHIRE. The good attendance at the picturesque enclosure of the Abergavenny Club on Monday, on the occasion of the above county match, must have been very gratifying to the committee who selected Abergavenny for the game, and it is hoped that next season will see other county teams here. The excellent condition of the wicket was due to the skill and experience of Turner, the home professional, both teams expressing themselves highly pleased with the pitch prepared. Neither team was at full strength, but local interest in the game was increased by the fact that that promising young Abergavenny cricketer, Mr. Wyndham Lewis, was making his first appearance for the county. Carmarthenshire defeated Cornwall last week so decisively that their comparative failure on Monday on an easy wicket was very disappointing, Lockyer, James and Weldon being the only batsmen to reach double figures. Silverlock accomplished a good performance by taking six wickets for 23 runs, his analysis reading 17 overs, 7 maidens, 23 runs, 6 wickets. The famous Newport professional followed up his bowling feat by treating the spectators to one of his characteristic centuries. Going to the wicket with Maurice Stratton, the bowling was speedily mastered, James. Gee, Gravelle, Wel-don, Morgan and Bevan having a turn with the ball, the latter effecting a separation at 127 by bowling Stratton, whose useful 42 included five boundaries. Capt. Giles now partnered Silverlock, and the score rapidly rose. This second partnership realised 142, Silverlock losing his wicket to the left-handed Gee at 269. Silverlock's grand innings of 146 was a fine batting display, and, though missed on a couple of occasions, it was the exhibition of a class batsman. He hit 23 fours. Wyndham Lewis joined Capt. Giles, and, though lucky early on, he afterwards batted very well, the score being carried to 347 when stumps were drawn for the day. Owing to the heavy rain in the succeeding night and morning, play could not be resumed until half-past three on Tuesday. Monmouthshire declared at their overnight score of 347, Capt. Giles having the fine score of 93 to his credit, while Wyndham Lewis's 26 was a good contribution. The wicket had suffered so from the rain that the second failure of the visitors was not so remarkable, but James was the only batsman who appeared to play the right game under the circumstances. His 14 was got by forcing cricket. Evans was in a long time for his 12 not out. The total being 54, left the home county winners by an innings and 209 runs.
