SOLDIER WHO BROKE INTO CLUB PAVILION.

Private Charles Borrows, of the King's Shropshire Light Infantry and a native of Llanvihangel, was at Abergavenny on Wednesday charged with having wilfully damaged a glass panel and window at the cricket club pavilion, and also with having been found on enclosed premises.

Evidence was given that a groundsman, hearing a noise in the pavilion, found that prisoner had broken into it. He had also broken into the bowling club portion of the pavilion and damaged one of the cases. He was taken in charge.

Captain Knollys, of Abergavenny, said Borrows had been soldiering for about three months, and his Army character was good.

There were several convictions against the prisoner, however, and he was sent to prison for two months with hard labour.
