1936 was marked by two features which affected the cricket. In the first place the fixture list was in disarray, secondly the Club was short of players.

Monmouth had not prepared their ground for the visit of Abergavenny 1st X1 but Monmouth 2nd X1 came to Avenue Road and were 51 all out. AL.Pragnell taking 6 wickets for 3 runs. Abergavenny were 17-5 at one stage in reply but Guy O'Daly batting at number six ensured victory ending up with (103*) with seventeen fours and one six.

Usk scored 147 at Avenue Road, O'Daly took 6-33, leaving 90 minutes only to Abergavenny, but O'Daly's [72*] with C.Honeywell [22] and C.Price [21] making contributions raised the toatal to 151-5 for a good win.
