




# A Grand Cricket Season-records established at Abergavenny

March 31st Abergavenny Chronicle reported

"The qualities of Abergavenny Cricket Club are outstanding, and I know of no other club where the spirit of esprit de corps is so personified" said Mr JK Ruther, President of the club at the AGM at the Greyhound Hotel on Thursday last

The Abergavenny Chronicle welcomed the new season as follows "Tomorrow afternoon skipper Syd Stock will captain Abergavenny in their first match of the season, which is against Panteg at Avenue Road Ground. All the 'stalwarts' will again be seen in action although wicket keeper John Hill will be absent as he has decided to continue playing rugby until the end of the season, This will obviously not apply to Sunday games.



Pctured Left-Officers elected at AGM-On May 18<sup>th</sup> The club are due to host a two day Minor Counties match between Glamorgan and Worcester.

The opening fixture was against Panteg at Abergavenny. All the stalwarts of recent times will be once again in action this season. Wicket Keeper John Hill will be starting the cricket once the Rugby season is completed, although he will play on Sundays. Last season he caught or stumped 29 victims and in 42 games gave away 252 byes, which is an average of 6 per game.

April 22<sup>nd</sup> Panteg 104 all out. T.Adams 4-19 and S.Stock 3-11 L.White 2-24 W.Williams 1-28, Abergavenny 109 for 6. W.H.Sadler (16) W.Williams (19) Tommy Adams (37\*) and L.Thomas (16).

### Walk Over Victory over Army

The next day April 23<sup>rd</sup> Abergavenny beat 37<sup>th</sup> Army Regiment, Cwrt-y-Gollen. Abergavenny 164 all out. W.Williams (30) T.Adams (39) C.Berrington (17) and S.Stock (35\*) The Army were then bowled out for a mere 38 runs. Seven bowlers were used, Lew White 3-9 and T.Adams 2-15. April 30<sup>th</sup> Abergavenny 166-4 T.Adams (56\*)L.White (55) WMIE Ltd 66 Adams and Williams 4 wickets each.

May 6<sup>th</sup> Ross were next up at Avenue Road. Abergavenny 163-5 declared, G.Alderton (40) L.White (80) which included a six and seven 4's and T.Adams (15) Ross were 62 all out. Syd Stock 4-26 and T.Adams 5-28. May 7<sup>th</sup> -Then they easily beat Lysaughts who were all out for 86. Lew White 6-39 and W.Williams 2-28. Abergavenny winning by 5 wickets, 90-5. L.White (49) and H.Sadler (16)

May 13<sup>th</sup> Brecon 1<sup>st</sup> X1 away only reached 61 all out. Syd Stock 6-25 and Tommy Adams 4-35. Abergavenny lost 7 wickets reaching the target 72-7. H.Sadler (18), T.Adams (16\*) and E.Sandford (16\*) R.Jennings (11)

May 14<sup>th</sup> A draw with Lydney at Avenue Road followed. Lydney 178-5. Stock 2-16 and Adams and Alderton one wicket each. Abergavenny 172-8.T.Adams (26) W.Mayo (27)G.Alderton (39) and W.H.Sadler (24)

The 2<sup>nd</sup> X1 who were having a poor season played Bulmers, Abergavenny 2<sup>nd</sup>'s 111 all out. P.Bishop (30) C.F.R.Price (29) C.J.Cox (19) and J.R.Godfrey (15) Bulmers who were at one time 38-5 went on to make 153.

May 20<sup>th</sup> The better of a draw with local rivals Usk followed. Abergavenny 181-6 declared. L.White (50) S.Stock (65\*) including 5 fours and one six in one over and E.Sandford (28\*) Usk 77-7. White 2-22, W.Williams 1-18 and T.Adams 1-25. However the 2<sup>nd</sup> X1 lost to Usk 2<sup>nd</sup>'s. Abergavenny 2<sup>nd</sup>'s were 93 all out. B.Kendall (12) H.Bowkett (14) and C.J.Cox (35) Usk 2nds 152-5. With 4 wickets for Price.

May 27<sup>th</sup> The first X1 travelled to Leominster in their next match Leominster scraping a draw. Abergavenny 156-9 declared, W.Sadler (22), G.Alderton (52), L.White (18). Leominster hanging on at 84-9. 3 wickets for Stock, 4 for Williams and 2 for White.

May 28<sup>th</sup> Yet another draw with Newport Fugitives came next. Abergavenny 144 all out. W.Sadler (14), T.Adams (16), L.G.Jenkins (27), J.Hill (34) and D.Parry (18). Newport 95-6. 2 wickets for White, 2 for Adams and one for Parry.

On the Monday May 29th Crickhowell were the visitors and went back up the A40 with a victory. Crickhowell scoring 149 all out. D.Parry (5 wkts) and T.Adams (4 wkts) In reply Abergavenny were 74 all out. No batsman reached double figures. The weather became extremely hot during this time and the sun had not shone so brightly since September 1949.

June  $3^{rd}$  Abergavenny next lost to Whitchurch Heath away, who made 105 all out. Five wickets for L.White and four wickets for T.Adams. Abergavenny in reply made a disappointing 87 all out. Good efforts with the bat from Sadler, White, Hill and Parry who all made double figures.

# Abergavenny Cricket Club History

On June 4<sup>th</sup> A really close game followed against South Wales Hunt who won by one run. J.C.Clay was once again in their line up. S.W.Hunt 112 all out, Don Parry 3-38, T.Adams 3-21. (DR Dalglish 71, IE Pugh 28 & JC Clay 14) Abergavenny 111 all out after being 97-7. L.White (54), T.Adams (17) and L.Jones (13) (JT Morgan 11-1-23-4 & JC Clay 17-4-37-4)

The 2<sup>nd</sup> X1 obtained their first win of the season against Nylon Spinners who made 97 all out. M.Pritchard 5-35 and J. 3-29. Cliff Cox and W.G.Powell were the batting heroes.

June 9<sup>th</sup> Abergavenny 208-6 declared, rattled up a really good score against Monmouth. Tommy Adams (78\*) L.White (54) and Gerry Alderton (26). Monmouth were then dismissed for 116. White (3 wickets) Adams (3 wickets) Parry (2 wkts) and Stock (2 wkts)

June 11<sup>th</sup> Cardiff Innswingers were also defeated being all out for 116. Tommy Adams taking 6 wickets and L.White 3 wickets. Abergavenny knocking off the runs for the loss of 6 wickets. W.H.Sadler (43) T.Adams (27) and J.Hill (36\*)

The next weekend they registered another two victories. June 17<sup>th</sup> Pontypridd 102 all out. W.Williams 3-21, T.Adams 3-38, L.White 2-16 and D.Parry 1-24. Abergavenny got 69 without losing a wicket, Sadler (25) and T.Adams (60) finished on 111-4. The 2<sup>nd</sup> X1 125-9 drew with Pontypridd 2<sup>nd</sup> X1 193-3 declared.

June 18th Abergavenny 169-6 declared. L.White (49) H.Sadler (40) and L.G.Jones (30) Cardiff 102 all out. Lew White 5-28.T.Adams and D.Parry two wickets each and one for SH Stock.

On June 24<sup>th</sup> The game against St Fagans was disrupted by rain. St Fagans 165-6. Abergavenny 60-2 when it rained.

# Syd Stock out of the team with injury

Around this time June 25<sup>th</sup> they lost their skipper Syd Stock for a few weeks with 'fluid on the knee' This coincided with a defeat to Ross who bowled Abergavenny out for 70. Only R.Jenninsg and E.Sandford making any worthwhile runs. Ross batted on after securing victory and were eventually all out for 133. The 2<sup>nd</sup> X1 89 all out also lost to Ross 2<sup>nd</sup> X1 176-8.

On July 1<sup>st</sup> Pontypridd gained revenge for a recent defeat. They made 164 for 9, 3 wickets each for White and Williams. Abergavenny were 78 all out. H.Sadler (23) and T.Adams (19)

## **Harold Sadler missing for six weeks**

The first X1 then lost Harold Sadler for 6 weeks. He was required to attend a Police Instruction Course in Harrogate. Before he went though he scored (70) runs against Sphinx X1 on July 2<sup>nd</sup> Sphinx 204-6, Abergavenny 193-4 nearly pulling off a brilliant victory. Lew White also made (49)

The Pontypridd 2<sup>nd</sup> X1 171 all out ensured the double was completed with a comprehensive victory over Abergavenny 2<sup>nd</sup> X1 123 all out. H.Bowkett (27) W.J.Powell (38)

On July 8th Abergavenny secured a draw against Brecon who made 165 all out. 4 wickets each for White and Adams. Abergavenny hanging on at 97-9, T.Adams (16), L.White (18) W.Williams (33), S.H.Stock (12)

July 9<sup>th</sup> A welcome victory came against Mr J.Copes X1 (Ebbw Vale) who only made 79 all out. Five wickets for Don Parry. Abergavenny 81-5 T.Adams (18), L.G.Jones (12), W.Williams (36\*) They then played a 12 over match. Abergavenny 118-9 W.Mayo(62) Ebbw Vale 129-2.

On the 16<sup>th</sup> July Rain affected the match with Hereford where the pitch was not conducive to batting. Abergavenny 93 all out. T.Adams (30) G.Alderton (29) and S.Stock (14\*) Hereford 55-5, 3 wickets for Adams and two wickets for Parry.

July  $23^{\rm rd}$  A 28 over match was possible with Whitchurch Heath who made 88-9 and Abergavenny were all out for 68. T.Adams (24) and G.Alderton (20)

July 29<sup>th</sup> Away at St Fagans who totalled 232-4, two wickets for Alderton. Abergavenny 113 all out. A number of batsmen made starts and could not press on to a decent score.

# Seconds do well

The 2<sup>nd</sup> X1 101-5 M.Powell (30) W.J.Powell (43\*) managed to secure a draw with St Fagan's 2<sup>nd</sup> X1 109 all out. EG Nash 4-20, B.Crocker 3-15.

#### **G.Lavis**

The Monmouthshire-born player had made his debut in 1928 as a right-handed batsman and seam bowler, and became a regular member of the side in the early 1930's. His finest hour as a player came in 1934 when he hit a career best 154 against Worcestershire in 1934, and shared in a partnership of 236 for the fourth wicket with Cyril Smart. However, he had rather modest season with bat and ball in 1936 and again in 1937, and left the county's playing staff to pursue a playing and coaching career in Scotland. Lavis subsequently played for Dundee and Forfarshire in 1938 and 1939, before joining the joining the R.A.F. during the Second World War......

....With Glamorgan re-building after the War, Johnnie Clay persuaded Lavis to return to Glamorgan as the club's coach, and with the club also being short of players, Lavis also agreed to turn out for the county again. He played his final game for the club in 1949 and was awarded a Testimonial in 1950



### Benefit Match Scorecard -Left



The highlight of the season was the Benefit Match for George Lavis who had played for Glamorgan from 1928 until after the Second World War, when from 1946 Lavis acted as Glamorgan`s coach. Many young players duly benefitted from his wise words and the long hours of patient guidance in the club`s indoor school at Neath, and the nets in corridor of the North Stand at the Arms Park.

## **That Bank Holiday Feeling**

August 7<sup>th</sup> Abergavenny 226-8 declared. Tommy Adams (99), W.Williams (34), White (30) and H.Brain (24). Crickhowell 130-4 securing a draw. Perhaps it was the match with Glamorgan that caused Abergavenny to give such a good batting performance when they went to Crickhowell on Monday. The opening pair put on 116 and Crickhowell tried 6 bowlers.

The seconds 85-6 drew with Bulmers 158 and then 150 all out drew with Crickhowell 133-5. Stan Hall and J.R.Godfrey batting well.

### No Ground for complaint

The avenue road ground has stood up well to the demands put on it this season. With heavy rain softening it like a sponge the ground has been susceptible to unusual wear and tear and in patches mud has replaced grass yet by changing the wicket and nursing the ground those responsible for looking after the playing pitch have managed to overcome the damage inflicted by the weather and allowed more games to be played than might have been thought possible.

August 27<sup>th</sup> Abergavenny were reduced to 26-6 against Brecon and finished on 120-8 declared Syd Stock (40) and W.Williams (30) Brecon forced a draw after it was agreed to extend the finishing time by 15 mins and with 12 minutes to go Brecon needed 31, but could only draw finishing on 105. John Hill with 4 victims 2 caught 2 stumped. Whitfield 3-13 and Adams 4-37. Gwyn Williams of Llanelly and Glamorgan Minor Counties almost won it for Brecon with 61 runs including 3 successive sixes.


