Abergavenny's connection with Glamorgan C.C.C continued with Glamorgan Under 25's playing a fixture at Avenue Road versus Gloucestershire Under 25's

Once again the first game of the season April 15th was against Mumbles, it needed to be a 12 a side game to accommodate all of the players available. Abergavenny were dismissed for 97 runs. Brian Shackleton with (15) and Mike Powell (26) were the main contributors for Abergavenny and Mumbles won by 2 wickets. A.Lloyd 3-35, M.Farr 3-22 and J.Baker 3-11 were the wicket takers.

April 22nd The game against local rivals at Panteg saw Stuart Harrison of Glamorgan C.C.C. fire them out, Stuart taking 5-21. Chasing 120-3 declared, Abergavenny were all out for 49.

April 23rd A tame draw against Newport Fugitives followed. Abergavenny scoring 125-5 declared Mike Powell (49) Bill Powell (33*) with the Fugitives reaching 81-6, M.Farr 2-35 and J.Baker 2-17 were the main weket takers with P.Butterfield and A.Lloyd taking a wicket each.

Rain and more rain ruined a good few weekends and the next game Sunday May 14th was against Midsomer Norton who won by 4 wkts, Abergavenny 85 all out with almost half the runs scored by David Griffin (40) Mike Farr, Paul Butterfield and J.Baker taking the wickets for Abergavenny.

May 27^{th} The first team game with Worcester at home the following week was cancelled so a strengthened 2^{nd} X1 took on Worcester 2^{nd} X1(a). Mike Powell scored a century (108) out of 146-6 and Worcester were bowled out for 86, with M.Ozelton taking 5-34 and D.James 4-23.

On the Monday May 29th a Severn Counties league game against Lydney brought defeat. Abergavenny 113 all out with D.Griffin scoring (51) Lydney getting home at 114-4 'Basher' Brain, who would go on to score many runs against Abergavenny and other teams, was in sparkling form with (50*)

Rain spoiled the game against Hereford (a) on June 4^{th} , Abergavenny scored130-7 Dave Griffin (72*) and Hereford were 2-0 when the rain came.

A victory over Tredomen in the Monmouthshire Knock Out Cup followed, Abergavenny only managed to total 69 with M.Powell scoring (29). Tredomen were even worse and finished 38 all out thanks to Tony Paton with 5-14.

Yet another draw followed against Ross (a) June 11th. Abergavenny 130 all out with Ken Williams top scoring with (31) Ross managed just 72-8 Mike Farr taking 6-29.


Skipper hits 44 to give Town runaway victory

Meanwhile the 2nd X1 drew their away game at Monmouth, batting first they scored 134 thanks to a top score of [54] by Doug James and a fine debut [24] for N.Bird. R.Morris [13] G.Jones [13] AK Mead [15]Monmouth 2nd X1 finished on 89-6 with A.Lloyd- 3-43 and debutante N.Bird-3-13

June 18th After bowling out Newbridge at home for a meagre 72 with Paul Butterfield returning 6-14 and two wickets for A.Lloyd and one for Mike Farr. Abergavenny were disappointingly 'skittled' out for 43. With no Abergavenny batsman getting into double figures

June 24th A further defeat ensued with St Fagans (h) only scoring 130-6 thanks to Mike Farr taking 3-49, however in reply Abergavenny were 124 all out with only Robin Williams (38) scoring significantly.

June 25^{th} at home Neath Ad Libs scored 155-5 Robin Williams 2-21 and Abergavenny secured a draw at 125-4 D.Griffin (43).


Revenge was exacted on local rivals Panteg on July 1st at home who were beaten, chasing 169-7. Mike Farr taking 4-33 and A.Lloyd with 2-31. Abergavenny with D.Griffin (40) and P.Butterfield (39*) passed the total for the loss of only 5 wickets.


July 2nd Abergavenny declared on 141-7 with Peter Jones (46*) and Mike Powell (48) scoring the bulk of the runs versus Ebbw Vale, who struggled but held on for a draw.

July 15th A defeat by Ludlow followed losing by 3 wickets despite some good bowling from Paul Butterfield with 4-47 and Mike Farr 2-39, was followed by a draw against Whiteheads with Abergavenny making 160-8 declared major contributions once again from M.Powell(69) and D.Griffin (40). Whiteheads finished on 110-7 with J.Baker 3-22 and A.Paton 3-29 making things difficult for the Whiteheads batsmen.

July 22nd The top order came good against fierce rivals Usk and secured a 7 wicket victory. Usk 119-10 P.Butterfield 2-30, J. Baker 3-36, R.Williams 3-27 & M.Farr 2-23. A strong 'Australian X1' easily passed Abergavenny's 206-9 dec. M.Powell (71) R.Brown (32) J,Baker took 4-43 for Abergavenny.

Mike Powell continued his fine form and scored 71 against a powerful Old Collegians Touring team that included a number of State players. He went on to complete 1,000 runs for the season.

July 36th and 27th Defeats against New Brighton and North Middlesex was followed by a win against Chepstow by 8 wickets. Chepstow 131-9 J.Baker 4-50 Abergavenny 133-2 D.Griffin (57*)

August 3rd Mayflies were easy winners despite a magnificent 6-39 from A.Paton. As Abergavenny were all out for 75. Hythe held on for a draw. P.Grattan and Brian Shackleton scoring runs and Mike Farr taking 4-28. Next to hold on for a draw was GKN, after Abergavenny had made 204-7 D.Griffin (65) Paul Butterfield (40*) GKN were 121-9 with Butterfield demonstrating his all-round ability taking 4-32.

Yet another draw followed this time with Crickhowell. Tony Paton taking 4-27. A journey to Somerset to play Midsomer Norton ended in defeat, despite (45) from Mike Powell. Five more draws against Usk and Malpas with runs for Ken Williams (38) and P.Grattan (48) and Lydney, Worcester and Ross leaving Abergavenny looking for their first win in 17 games.

Sept 10th Whitchurch Heath provided that elusive victory. Whitchurch 162-8 declared, Abergavenny 163-6 M.Powell (42) and D.Griffin (46)





Gary Sobers Benefit

The highlight of the season was a Benefit match for Gary Sobers, the greatest all round cricketer of all time. John Arlott wrote in 1979: "the finest all-round player in the history of cricket" Sir Don Bradman after Sobers scored 254, for the Rest of the World against Australia in 1971 in Melbourne wrote: "I believe Gary Sobers's innings was probably the best ever seen in Australia" He was a triple-purpose bowler with seam, orthodox finger spin and wrist spin. A master batsman and an exceptional fielder. On top of all this, Trevor Bailey in his biography of 1976 described him as: "an 'interesting' captain". For mere mortals in Abergavenny to brush shoulders with him at the ground and in the town centre betting office was a privilege that they probably didn't truly appreciate.

Four years earlier (1968) Sobers had dispatched Nash for 6 sixes in one over in an end of year encounter against Nott's at St Helen'sSwansea. Thus becoming the first ever cricketer to reach this milestone, creating a World Record Malcolm Nash was experimenting with slow left arm (Derek Underwood type)

The team included seven of the Nottingham C.C.C. staff, Gerry Sobers (Garys brother) Tony Saunders the Nottingham Secretary and ex Abergavenny player, David Brown of Warwickshire and England and David Evans the ex Glamorgan C.C.C. wicketkeeper.

Batting first the Gary Sobers X1 scored 267 for 6 wickets declared. In reply Abergavenny C.C. put up a good show with leading run scorer Mike Powell making (56) and Ken Williams (34) the main contributors. It was in this match that Mike Farr took his 1000th wicket for the club when he dismissed non other than Warwickshire's David Brown.
