

#### E.G.Nash 1909-1989

On January 28th 1989 the Club lost E.G. Ted' Nash who passed away aged 80 years. Ted had been synonymous with Abergavenny Cricket Club for many years, Most recently he had been President of the Club and one of the most popular officials the club has ever had. He took on the Presidency in 1971. He was first proposed as a playing member in 1925, so in total had a 64 year association with the Club.

He retired from playing in 1951, but watched with interest the development of his two sons Colin and Malcolm until they made their respective moves to London and Glamorgan. His endeavours for the Club and his Ambassadorial Role have been invaluable and he will be greatly missed by everyone.



Later in the year On 22<sup>nd</sup> August 1989 the Club was shocked to hear the news that a great friend and valued member Ken Davies BEM had passed away.


### Ken Davies BEM





Ninety-six Liverpool fans die in a crush during the Football Association (FA) Cup semifinal against Nottingham Forest at Hillsborough, Sheffield, England. Salvador Dalí, Spanish surrealist painter who also designed furniture, jewellery, and stage and film sets, dies in Figueras, Spain (84). Laurence Olivier, English stage and film actor, director, and producer, dies near London, England (82). The proceedings of the House of Commons are broadcast live on television in Britain for the first time, beginning with the debate on the Queen's Speech. Sales of compact discs overtake vinyl LPs for the first time in Britain.
